

You've probably heard the phrase "It's just like riding a bike!" in reference to revisiting something you used to know. It's repeated often because biking is a skill that stays with you once you've mastered it. At The Cabbage Patch, the biking program provides bicycles to children who wouldn't otherwise be able to afford them, and staff members train the children on safety and maintenance. This empowers the children with a pathway to independence, physical health and perseverance.

## "When I fall, The Patch heps me get back up."

Alexandra* is an eleven-year-old girl who participated in Bike Day Camp this year. She was the only camper that week with no knowledge of cycling and who was unable to ride a bike. However, Alexandra was determined to learn and was confident despite being so far behind her peers. For the first two days of camp Alexandra worked with staff on the basics of riding a bike while her peers rode greater distances with the other staff members. On the third day of camp, she rode the route with the rest of the camp. She was wobbly and fell several times, but staff members encouraged her and helped her to get back up with joy and determination.

By the end of the camp, you would not have been able to tell that Alexandra had learned how to ride a bike just that week. She is very proud of her accomplishment, and the experience of being supported by her fellow campers has given her a fresh sense of confidence and community. 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## Celebrating our Children

As we celebrate holidays and birthdays, it's easy to forget that merriment can be expensive and out of reach for many families. Many Patch Parents do not have money to spend on things like birthday gifts and/or entertainment for their children.

This summer, Sylvia* contacted The Patch's Family Development staff to ask if she could visit the "Birthday Closet" in order to choose a few birthday presents for her daughter. Toys/birthday gifts end up in the closet through a variety of ways. Extra donations for Christmas are put into the Birthday Closet and sometimes children of Patch supporters will ask guests who attend their birthday party to bring toys that are then donated to The Cabbage Patch.

Sylvia found several gifts for her daughter, and then staff surprised her by asking if she might want some free tickets to a Louisville Bats baseball game. These tickets were donated to The Cabbage Patch, and staff members were able to distribute them to several families.

Sylvia left with not only birthday gifts, but also with tickets to an entertainment experience that she would not have been able to afford without the help of The Patch. Afterward, Sylvia said, "My daughter has been talking about her birthday and the Bats game for weeks, and she plays with the toys she received every day. Thank you to everybody that helped us out!"

## Just a Few Minutes a Day

It's not all fun and games for staff members who run our recreation department! The Patch has a very fair, but stric $\dagger$ behavioral code and some members need help fitting in.
Recently, three pre-teen sisters returned to The Patch after being gone (willingly) for most of the summer. All 3 girls have been very close to permanently losing their membership due to constant behavior issues and the youngest was in an incident almost immediately upon return. Micah, our new Behavior Specialist, was able to deescalate her and together they determined that a lot of her behavior problems stem from anger.

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Since then, she has been meeting with Micah regularly. They complete anger management worksheets together and have been working through behavioral scenarios that seem to be a struggle for her. At first, she was reluctant and stated she would only spend "one minute a day" on anger management. Now she voluntarily spends 15 minutes or more each session, and pops in for extra encouragement when she needs it. This seems to be working wonders!

## Caroline Price Reid Educational Opportunities \& Recreation/Youth Development Funds

As a lifelong active member of Second Presbyterian Church, Caroline Price Reid was dedicated to expressing God's love through service to others. She was a great friend and supporter of The Cabbage Patch, and her named endowment funds ensure that her legacy continues to provide education, arts, athletics and leadership programming to Louisville's most vulnerable young people.

Caroline attended the old Ballard School, graduated from the Louisville Collegiate School, attended Wellesley College and graduated from the University of Louisville. During World War II, she worked as a draftsman in the engineering department of the Curtiss-Wright Corporation. After the war, she worked at the University of Louisville in the History of Art Department until her marriage to William Reid. They had three children Mac Reid (Tay), Barbara Reid (David), and Hensley Peterson (James). Her love of the arts continued throughout her life. Her childhood summers at Prestwould, near Clarkesville, VA, fostered a sustained interest in historic preservation and led to her involvement in the restoration efforts of the Prestwould Foundation. She was a member of the Colonial Dames and also a supporter of Bellewood Presbyterian Home for Children.

Caroline's daughters Barbara and Hensley created these two named endowment funds because they knew of their mother's dedication, support, and appreciation of The Cabbage Patch and its successful educational programs and recreation and youth development programs. Caroline was very impressed with Tracy Holladay and his leadership as Executive Director over many years, and they worked together for years to help sustain the vital work of The Cabbage Patch.

Tracy Holladay Honored as an Admired CEO

This year, Executive Director Tracy Holladay was selected by Business First as one of Louisville's Most Admired CEOs!

Louisville Business First Associate Editor Zak Owens said of the Most Admired CEOs class: "...There's a special kind of leader who thrives under the pressure. One who inspires a team with a clear and bold mission that allows an organization to soar. One who holds their people and their product above all else."

In 1984, Tracy called his first staff meeting to order with an inspirational message: "The more you express power, the less you express love." Throughout his career, he has been dedicated to serving those in need, and he does so with a humble spirit.

His immeasurable accomplishments include leading the strategic planning in 1984 that focused the mission on programs promoting self-sufficiency; expanding Family Development programming; founding Streetball Showdown, the first large-scale fundraiser that established special events as major funding sources for the organization; overseeing the facility expansion which added 19,000 square feet plus renovations, and formalizing the education department and College Scholars program.


In 2020, Tracy Holladay is retiring after 36 years as Executive Director of The Cabbage Patch. In all his time serving Louisville's children and families, he has continually assessed the multifaceted issue of poverty, adapting programs to the needs of those we serve. His contributions to the cause of reducing poverty in our city are immeasurable, but if we consider that The Patch serves approximately 1,000 individuals each year, it's safe to say he has changed tens of thousands of lives during his remarkable tenure.
